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A bishop (B) is a piece in the board game of chess. Each player begins the game with two The bishop has no restrictions in distance for each move, but is limited to diagonal movement. As a consequence of its diagonal movement, each bishop always remains on either the white or black squares, and so it is also.

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The Rules of Modern European Chess

The Bishop moves diagonally any number of squares, forwards or backwards. The diagram below shows all the possible squares to which the bishop may move.

Chess Rules for Bishop's Movement

The original move of the bishop was only three squares diagonally. fil (part bishop move), asp (knight), rukh (rook), and piyade (pawn).
